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this clearly articulated statement offers a hopeful and workable approach to conflict that eternally beleaguering human situation john paul lederach is internationally recognized for his breakthrough thinking and action related to conflict on all levels person to person factions within communities warring nations he explores why conflict transformation is more appropriate than conflict resolution or management but he refuses to be drawn into impractical idealism conflict transformation is an idea with a deep reach its practice says lederach requires both solutions and social change it asks not simply how do we end something not desired but how do we end something destructive and build something desired how do we deal with the immediate crisis as well as the long term situation what disciplines make such thinking and practices possible this title is part of the little books of justice and peacebuilding series

this book will outline a theological transformative approach that is effective in resolving congregational conflict and has shown that in the question of how the contemporary congregation might address conflict the answers lie not only in the process james taught his audience in his chapter four of his epistle but in a deeper understanding of the kind of kingdom jesus embodied and his expectations of how its members would live with a clear sense of their own standing before god and one another it will develop a dialogue between conflict theory and theology to create a solution that helps transform conflict into positive outcomes conflict transformation is a new approach to conflict resolution that attempts to describe what ought to happen in conflict more precisely it is a step beyond conflict resolution and points toward a deep transformation in the conflicting parties stopping the issues that trigger violence and allowing peace in relationships resolution focuses on the present conflict or issue and finds the solution transformation focuses on the people involved in the conflict and their permanent relationships with each other conflict transformation occurs only when true wisdom reigns among people in congregation it agrees with vayrynen 1991 that actor transformation is critical to transform conflict into something good and beneficial to the organization however unlike vayrynen it believes that unless actor transformations occur any other transformations e g issue rule and structure will be only temporary and the conflict that had been controlled in the present will reemerge later on in the future unless the falsely wise members are replaced with truly wise ones

this book seeks to examine the causes of escalation and de escalation in intrastate conflicts specifically the volume seeks to map the processes and dynamics that lead groups challenging existing power structures to engage in violent struggle the processes and dynamics that contribute to the de escalation of violent struggle and the participation of challengers in

peaceful political activities and the processes and dynamics that sustain and nurture this transformation by integrating the latest ideas with richly presented case studies this volume fills a gap in our understanding of the forces that lead to moderation and constructive engagement in the context of violent intrastate conflicts this volume will be of great interest to students of conflict management peace studies conflict resolution ethnic conflict and security studies in general

since the early 1980s john paul lederach has traveled worldwide as a mediation trainer and conflict resolution consultant currently the director of the international conciliation committee he has worked with governments justice departments youth programs and other groups in latin america the philippines cambodia as well as asia and africa lederach blends a special training method in mediation with a tradition derived from his work in development throughout the book he uses anecdote and pertinent experiences to demonstrate his resolution techniques with an emphasis on the exchange involved in negotiation lederach conveys the key to successful conflict resolution understanding how to guide disputants transform their conflicts and launch a process that empowers them

central to a transformational approach to conflict is the idea that conflicts must be viewed as embedded within broader relational patterns and social and discursive structures and must be addressed as such this implies the need for systemic change at generative levels in order to create genuine transformation at the level of particular conflicts central also to this book is the idea that the origins of transformation can be momentary or situational small scale or micro level as well as bigger and more systemic or macro level micro level changes involve shifts and meaningful changes in communication and related patterns that are created in communication between people such transformative changes can radiate out into more systemic levels and systemic transformative changes can radiate inwards to more micro levels this book engages this transformative framework within this framework this book pulls together current work that epitomizes and highlights the contribution of communication scholarship and communication centered approaches to conflict transformation in local community regional environmental and global conflicts in various parts of the world the resulting volume presents an engaging mix of scholarly chapters think pieces and experiences from the field of practice the book embraces a wide variety of theoretical and methodological approaches as well as transformative techniques and processes including narrative

dialogic critical cultural linguistic conversation analytic discourse analytic and rhetorical this book makes a valuable contribution to the ongoing dialogue across and between disciplines and people on how to transform conflicts creatively sustainably and ethically

this book outlines the generalist approach to conflict resolution the approach was inspired by the generalist approach to social work but has now emerged in the fields of conflict resolution and peace studies essentially the approach considers conflict resolution practice and scholarship very broadly generalist scholarship and practice are contrasted against specialized ways of conducting conflict resolution whereby practitioners become well versed in one mode of practice or a specific theoretical orientation to scholarship several theories provide a foundation for this inclusive approach conflict transformation eco systemic scholarship the strengths perspective and a new theory of social conflict the theory of differences the generalist approach is intended to provide a way for conflict resolution and peace studies scholar practitioners to help diverse parties address complex conflicts at various levels personal to international generalist scholar practitioners assist parties to comprehensively and holistically address these conflicts in a multi layered multi level fashion but they must be comfortable with ambiguity monitor intervention complexity and give parties control over how their conflicts are addressed ultimately this may make parties more committed to their conflict interventions and outcomes

this work raises questions on whether and how to effectively resolve conflict taking stock of the ideas assumptions and practices of this emerging field the book provides an examination of conflict theory and practice focusing on politics and international relations as well as biology culture management psychology and social psychology central to its thesis is the

interaction between the skills of resolving conflict and societal pressures for conflict's continuation conflict resolution is a growth area of study its methods are applicable in domestic violence as well as in attempts to secure world peace this text is written in a deliberately provocative way which does not include every side to an argument

we all long for peace within ourselves families communities countries and throughout the world we wonder what we can do about the multitude of conflicts currently wreaking havoc across the globe and the continuous reports of violence in communities as well as within families most of the time we contemplate solutions beyond our reach and overlook a powerful tool that is at our disposal forgiveness as a genocide survivor i know something about it as the genocide unfolded in rwanda in 1994 i was devastated by what i believed to be the inevitable deaths of my loved ones the news that my parents and my seven siblings had indeed been killed was simply unbearable anger and bitterness became my daily companions likewise i continued to wonder how the hutus and tutsis in rwanda could possibly reconcile after one of the most horrendous genocides of the 20th century it was not until i came to understand the notion of forgiveness that i was able to see the light at the end of the tunnel common wisdom suggests that forgiveness comes after a perpetrator makes a genuine apology this wisdom informs us that in the aftermath of a wrongdoing the offender must acknowledge the wrong he or she has done express remorse express an apology commit to never repeating said harm and make reparations to the extent possible only then can the victim forgive and agree to never seek revenge

the collection of contributions to this volume addresses such burning issues as natural resource management conflict transformation and co operation in sub regions of the horn of africa the individual pieces of action oriented field research constitute the final report of the international research project on environmental conflict management ecoman ecoman focuses on theory and practice of environmental conflict management in the horn of africa on one hand it draws from the discussion launched in the mid nineties about environmental security and about political legal and institutional approaches to deal with highly complex and multi party conflict on the other hand it refers to traditional and or local mechanisms of conflict regulations if and when resource use and distribution is involved it adopts mainly a transformatory approach using process oriented and interactive problem solving methods
